# **RINGING FOR THE QUEEN**

At midday on Friday 8th September, the day after the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II at Balmoral, I was privileged to be part of a nation-wide gathering of ringers in church towers throughout the Nation to mark the Queen's passing in this time-honoured manner.



Tolling a single bell can be a lonely business. It is also a tricky one to get right as the ringer has to count the number of years of a person's life. So, in Her Majesty's case it required a remarkable ninety-six single and separate strikes (or, in some circumstances, double) strikes to be right.

So I was very grateful for Churchwarden Shirley Rimmer's company in the ringing chamber as she counted the 30 seconds intervals we decided to keep between strikes and counted down from 96 (or was it up to 96?) so we got the right number. Bell-ringers will know from Shirley's photo (left) that I am ringing the bell up ready to start.

This was, in some ways, a rather surreal experience with the thought no one had performed this specific rite in our parish church (or indeed any other) since 1952 when King George VI had died, and that it will not be performed again until the end of the reign of King Charles III.

Here briefly, is the story of one family. The mother arrived in mid-July with her six-year-old daughter eventually reaching Norfolk via Moldova and Bucharest from Odessa, where they had spent days in basements sheltering from regular missile attacks, leaving her husband still working there. One of the many tragedies of this conflict is how close families have been divided by support for opposing sides. This family has experienced this pain, a very real pain. It is wonderful though, that there is now a group of Ukrainians from Lviv, Kyiv, Kharkiv, the Donbas, Mariupol, Odessa and elsewhere, who have known each other for years, all within visiting distance in S. Norfolk reducing their feelings of total isolation.

I am aware of some 30 Ukrainians here or soon to arrive in our vicinity! That says it all. Jobs are the main thing for

And we have nothing but praise for S.Norfolk Council's dedicated, enthusiastic and helpful staff. They, in our brief experience have been brilliant.



# Long-awaited Opening of Wellbeck Marsh

An enthusiastic group of members, supporters and guests of Bergh Apton's Conservation Trust met on the 10th September ,in the early autumn sunshine ,to finally celebrate the formal opening of Welbeck Marsh, a 12-acre extension to its nature reserve.

The new area of marsh and wet woodland has been purchased with grant-aid from Bergh Apton Parish Council, South Norfolk District Council, Bergh Apton Village Hall Committee and the Geoffrey Watling Charity bringing the area protected to a total of 22 acres, after successive acquisitions over the last 28 years.

In his welcome, Professor Anthony Davy, Chairman of BACT said: "This is an exciting and important acquisition for the Trust, more than doubling the reserve area. Apart from diversifying the habitats protected, it is well-known that larger areas have disproportionate advantages for conservation ecology over smaller ones." The reserve currently comprises varied habitats of marsh, woodland and scrub, and incudes ponds, dykes and riverbanks. Lorie Lain-Rogers, a founding (and current) Trustee said: "I am absolutely delighted to open Welbeck Marsh formally to our members and visitors. What an amazing journey we have been on! I don't think any of us who embarked on buying our first 4.5 acres of a disused gravel pit in July 1994 could ever have dreamed of this day."

It was also a fitting opportunity to inaugurate an oak bench seat in memory of devoted, long-serving Trustee and Hon. Secretary, Mrs Stephanie Crome.

The event also celebrated the results of the Chet Valley B-Line, an ambitious, community-based project seeking to improve habitats for bees, hoverflies, butterflies and other pollinating insects along a 17-km stretch of the River Chet - from its source in Poringland to Hardley, where it meets the Yare.

# MORE ABOUT THE BERGH APTON LANCER

Over the last fifteen or so years, and from time to time, I have popped into the Newsletter an update on the (true) story of a Bergh Apton soldier who wrote in 1915 to Harvey Thursby, then the Rector, to tell him about taking part in one of the last charges with the lance of the British cavalry.

Just to remind those of you intrigued by the tale, I tell of Charles Vaughan of the 12 th Lancers. He was a seasoned cavalryman who, when his unit was based in Norwich, met and married Sarah, the daughter of the Bergh Apton builder Maurice Redgrave. Soon after their marriage (in January 1914) war broke out between Britain and Germany. It was a war that was to last for five years and cost many millions of lives throughout the world (no wonder we call if 'The Great War' or 'World War One'.

Days after the war started (on 4th August) Charles and the whole of the 12 th Lancers left their barracks at the foot of Mousehold in Norwich to face the Germans in the Belgian town of Mons.

Following a fierce battle - and a poor military decision by the French General Staff - and to prevent a military disaster, the whole of the British Expeditionary Force fell back nearly 200 miles to the river Marne in what has

b e c o m e infamous as 'The Retreat from Mons'.

It was during that retreat that Charles Vaughan's unit, near a small



village called Moy de 'Aisne just south of St Quentin, met up with a unit of the Prussian Dragoon Guards. In a headlong charge into the midst of the dismounted German cavalry, Charles and his companions inflicted some serious damage with their lances. The oil painting shown to the left is of them riding back through their lines, celebrating the rout of the enemy.

So why, you may ask, am I telling you all this? Well, in the nearly twenty years since we uncovered this tale of derring-do what has been lacking has been an idea of what Charles Vaughan looked like at about the time of this affray. With the help of Vaughan's grandson Gordon Clarke, far away in Thailand where he lives, that search has now ended with this image he sent via email.

So, this is our man, in a photo taken some three years after the charge at Moy de 'Aisne

when he has been commissioned into another cavalry regiment, the 6 th (Inniskilling) Dragoons, who were known 'The as Skins' (or, more irreverently 'The Donkey Wallopers'). One of The Skins more memorable sons was Captain L. G. Oates, better known as 'Titus Oates' who died with Robert Falcon Scott on their ill-fated return from the South Pole in 1912.



This image is very grainy and our next step is to see if we can have it improved by modern digital enhancement technology. But, as the only known image of our man, it's good enough for now.

# **OBITUARY - MORENA LESTER**

Morena (pron. Morenna) Lester who died on 8th August in the Norfolk & Norwich Hospital, was the wife of the late David Lester of Hellington Corner who pre-deceased her in September 2021.

They were married for 65 years and had raised their three children, Simon,

Liz and David in the same house they moved into soon after their wedding. It was close both to Colin Carver's market garden (now Green Pastures) where David worked at that time, and to Mill Farm where Morena was Head Girl of the internationally-recognised Mill Farm Arabian Stud where she worked side- by-side with its owner Alison Hardcastle. Few of today's Bergh Apton's residents will have known the redoubtable Alison Hardcastle and her remarkable stud where she established a successful Arab bloodline through her foundation mare Scindia. This mare, covered by

the stallion Indian Magic, produced the stallion Scindian Magic who stood at the stud for over twenty years and fathered many progeny.

One Scindian owner, writing in 2005, commented; 'This is quite a remarkable family. Very small, yet every one has turned out out to be a quality horse - and just about every male from this dam line has proven himself a superior animal. How many 'fashionable' families can say the same?"

Called 'Ren' by Alison, and known by the stable staff as 'Aunty Ren', Morena was respected by Alison for her knowledge of horses and for her honest opinions and she played no small part in the

Stud's success.

Born Morena Prendergast in Essex in 1938, she was evacuated at the beginning of World War 2, with the youngest of her brothers, to Wales. One of her elder brothers, serving in HM Forces, was killed when a bomb fell on a train on which he was travelling. Morena never re-joined her birth family and was raised by foster parents. She left school to begin a pursing caroor at St Bartholomow's Hospital (Barts) in



nursing career at St Bartholomew's Hospital (Barts) in A young Morena Prendergast London but that start in her working life does not seem to have lasted very long and ended when she left to follow her interest in horses.

Morena arrived in Bergh Apton after spending a time in Newmarket where her light 8-stone weight was ideal when 'riding out' in the early mornings to exercise race horses on the Newmarket Gallops. One incident she recalled from those times was having a spectacular fall from a horse that had a trick, at a full gallop, of dropping a shoulder to ditch its rider. Her fellow riders could do nothing but watch as Katy (as they called her) tumbled over and over downhill to end up unhurt.

To bolster the family's income Morena was also a courier for Securicor in which employment she remembered one incident where, as the driver safely secured in the vehicle, she saw her partner being attacked by an assailant with a cricket bat!. After retiring she worked as a volunteer driver for the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital patient service.

Morena's funeral was on 14th September at Bergh Apton church.

## THE HARE – OPEN AGAIN FOR ONE NIGHT ONLY

We've probably used this headline - or a variation of it – around this time every year since 2006 to report the annual celebration by members of Bergh Apton's Local History Group and their friends to remember The Hare - the pub that once stood nearest to the centre of Bergh Apton.

This year they met in the garden of Royston House, Andrew and Gill Waters' home on the corner of The Street and Threadneedle Street. That was where the pub moved in the 1790s (that's not a typing error, it really was the 1790s) until it closed its doors a few years later - the last year it is recorded as 'an alehouse' being in 1803.

Before it moved to Royston House it had stood in Bob Debbage's field in Threadneedle Street opposite Mill Loke since much earlier in the eighteenth century, appearing in the records in that location under the name 'The Adam and Eve' before 1767 (the year it changed its name to The Hare).





BALHG had planned to have this year's celebration on that spot (where one can still find traces of the building demolished in the 1950s) but the

# NOW YOU SEE 'EM, NOW YOU DON'T!

There is an entry in the minutes the Village Hall AGM of 1984, in the time that the late Fred Littlewood was Chairman and Jill Emms was Treasurer, that records; "Fifty conifers have been planted along the [by Ed; northern] boundary, given by the Parish Council . . . ".

Those leylandii (Cupressus x leylandii)\*\*, after thirty eight years, are no more. Professional tree-surgeons Arborpro (see the note below) have removed the trees and ground out their stumps so that the ground can be readied to plant up a new hedge of mixed native species later this year, when the conditions are right.

This is the outcome of concern expressed by the village hall trustees at both the height and the condition of the trees. They consulted Long Stratton-based Arborpro on the best course of action and, when advised that the trees are probably too old to survive the experience and live, and were likely to begin to fail one-by-one soon anyway, they took the decision to have them felled.

The trustees have used their demise as an opportunity to plant a hedge of native UK species. The considerable cost of this new hedge will be funded in part by the village hall and in part by a grant obtained through the Norfolk arm of FWAG (the Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group).

The old trees were felled in early September and the success of that operation was due in no small part to the invaluable help of Richard and Rebecca Foreman of the adjacent Veranda Cottage.

This upheaval came barely two weeks after their wedding, when they must have longed for a bit of tranquillity after all the excitement. But they agreed that the contractor could drop these 65-foot (20 metres) tall giants onto their meadow and that allowed Arborpro both to avoid damage to the play park and to dismember the trees on the village hall land.

This huge operation has made a permanent change to the landscape around the village hall. In the short term the now-naked boundary between the Foreman's meadow and the village hall will be delineated by a 6 ft-high wooden fence to protect their privacy. Within 5 years the new planting will soften that rather harsh border and the hedge, as it matures, will become as familiar a sight to future generations of Bergh Aptoners as the now-departed stark sentinels of the old hedge have been for us.

\*\* The Leylandii is a hybrid cross between a Monterey and a Nootka cypress. Being sterile it cannot reproduce other than by cuttings. It was bred, by chance, at Leighton Hall in Powys in 1888 and Wikipedia's entry records its normal life expectancy as 'between 10 and 25 years' so these 38year-old specimens are real grand-daddys!



#### HOW ARBORPRO FELLED THE LEYLANDII

Is the thought of felling a long line of 20-metre-high trees a bit daunting for you? For anyone except an experienced tree surgeon it should be! But it is all in a day's work for Jonathan Vaughan and his team at Arborpro (Arborpro Tree Services Ltd).

In just over three days they did the job in a way that was impressive to watch. The lower eight feet or so of each tree's branches were lopped off and the tree felled so that it dropped onto Richard and

Rebecca's meadow. Then it was a simple (but heavy!) job to attach a chain to the trunk and mechanically drag it onto the village hall green where an array of machinery cleared the remaining 50-or-so feet of branches and passed them through a chipping machine into a huge skip. Finally, the trunk was cut into lengths that went into another huge skip. Sounds simple, doesn't it? But, as the adverts say; 'don't try this at home'!!!

In addition, there are two further bins on the village boundary – one in Mill Road near the Cattery and one at the Thurton end of Cookes Road.


We would be really grateful if dog owners would make use of these bins - or
