## Spring into action....and make Bergh Apton bloom this summer!



Bergh Apton has always been known as a village of fiercely passionate growers. From the bygone days of a booming farming and market gardening community, to the heady days of the sculpture trails which so many of you will remember, we've always had much to be proud of with our plots.

As winter hopefully transitions into spring now, its time to dust off our spades and get gardening to kickstart the new season. For some, it can be difficult to know where to start, so here's some quick tips from the Green Pastures team to set your garden up for the summer.

### **Clean Slate**

Before getting immersed in the springtime routine, a good clear up from the previous season can make all the difference. An unusual combination of climatic conditions in the second half of last year

resulted in more than the normal number of evergreens succumbing to the early freeze, so any of these which look dead should be removed or pruned hard back "just in case".

### Lawn First

Getting the lawn looking great is often one of the quickest, but visually most rewarding uses of your time when getting back into the garden in the spring. Simply starting the mowing routine and trimming up the edges alone will make a big impact. Applying a granular "weed and feed" will enhance the lawn even further. Look out for new "herbicide free" and "child and pet safe" products now on the market. April is also the best time to sow grass seed too.



### Rejuvenate the Borders

A good forking and hoeing of the borders will be much appreciated by your plants and not tomention the soil if you take the chance to add any organic matter back into it. Applying a mulch of manure or soil conditioner adds life into the soil and has all manner of benefits. It's also a great time to feed your plants and pelleted chicken manure is a brilliant and most cost-effective spring fertiliser.

### Slowly Does It

Any planted containers you have must also be fed, but sadly most do get forgotten! Replace whatever compost you can scrape away from the surface of the pot and at the same time apply a "slow release" or "controlled release" fertiliser which will cleverly give your plants a base feed for the rest of the growing season. Richard Jackson gives a great demonstration of "how to top dress plants" on You-Tube!

### Take a You-Tube Pruning Crash Course!

There's always lots of pruning to do in early spring and this can be rather baffling for the novice gardener. We're always very pleased to advise customers with questions of this nature, but we've found one of the best tools in the modern-day gardener's shed is You-Tube! Here you can watch step by step pruning demonstrations for just about anything so if there's a plant that's baffling you, just look it up!





### Sow Now!

April's a great time to sow a whole host of flowers, vegetables and herbs. Growing from seed is one of the greatest joys of gardening, whether it's a few sprouting seeds in the airing cupboard, or a whole range of crops to "grow your own". Cornflower, Cosmos and Verbena are my top recommendations for easy to grow flowers which will very quickly provide a huge return of colour for just a very modest investment. And the wildlife will greatly appreciate your efforts too!

## Reg Charity No 1048271 Annual Litter Pick Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> March 2023

The annual Litter Pick, run by Bergh Apton Conservation Trust, took place on Sunday 12th March which was amazingly the 9th year we have run it. The weather was good, not too hot, not too cold, not too windy and no rain. With 11 volunteers we split into five teams and each started at one extremity of the village and worked our way to the Village Hall, all ending up there at roughly the same time about two hours later.

This year the task was bit easier as starting so early in the year (South Norfolk advised me we were the first village to do a 'Litter Pick' in their area this year) the vegetation was low. As last time there was a marked reduction in the amount of litter around but even so we filled four large sacks of general rubbish plus three of cans and plastic bottles and one of glass bottles, less than half than what we used to collect in the earlier years. There were also no large items dumped: no televisions, garden furniture or domestic appliances this year. I cannot claim that litter picking is enjoyable, but it is fulfilling in that we feel we are achieving something worthwhile and making Bergh Apton a nicer place to live.

As usual my thanks go to South Norfolk Council for providing the equipment and hi-viz jackets, plus a small donation for our efforts, but especially to those BACT members; Shirley, Mike R, Mike M, Annette, Heather, Hilary, John, Rodney, Janet, Sabrina and not forgetting our four-legged helpers Cannie and Jasper who turned out to help with the Litter Pick as we could not have done it without them. ## COOK'S CORNER



I am sure there are many of you in the village who like to bake, cook or make preserves...so send me your favourite recipe with a good photograph and we can share it amongst the residents of Bergh Apton. Thanks very much to **Rachel Parfitt** for our first contribution, with Nanny Eileen's Irish Soda Bread...looks delicious!

#### NANNY EILEEN'S IRISH SODA BREAD

500 gms Plain White flour [extra for dusting] 1 tsp Bicarb of Soda 1 tsp Salt 400 ml Buttermilk [or full fat milk soured with tablespoon lemon juice or vinegar]

1.Sift the flour, bicarb of soda and salt into a large bowl, make a well in the centre of the flour mix and pour in the buttermilk [or alternative mixture]. Mix with a **cold metal spoon**. Once a soft dough begins to forms use your hands to gather the mix together. This process may be done in a **Food Mixer**.

2. Lightly dust a baking tray with flour. Turn out the dough onto a floured work surface and shape the dough with your hands into a round shape approx 18cms in diameter, use your palms to flatten the dough, treat the dough gently and do not over work it.

**3.** Place the loaf on the prepared baking tray and cut a deep cross 2.5 cms in the top, this is not just traditional but it aids the cooking process so it is cooked evenly in the centre.

Now be sure to prick each quarter section of the loaf with the point of a knife as this allows the fairies to escape otherwise they will create mischief in your kitchen.

4. Bake in a preheated oven [fan] at 200degrees C [gas mk 6] for 25-30 minutes. Then turn the bread over and bake for a further 5-10 mins or until the loaf sounds hollow when tapped with the knuckles on the base.

 $\ensuremath{\mathbf{5}}$  . Leave on a wire rack to cool. Then best served on the day of making.

To make a fruit loaf just add a good handful of dried fruit with the flour mix.

Using Jumbo Golden Sultanas [available at Green Pastures farm shop] makes a very acceptable moist loaf. When serving, spread liberally with butter from the Emerald Isle.

As the Irish say "Slánte" " Give it a lash".





#### LOCAL ELECTIONS - Photo ID Requirement

District and Parish elections are taking place in the Broadland District and South Norfolk Council areas on **Thursday 4 May 2023.** 

Residents need to be registered to vote on the electoral register if they wish to vote at these elections. Most residents will already be registered to vote, however, if you have recently moved or not registered, you will need to register by Monday 17 April 2023. The quickest and easiest way to register to vote is online by visiting www.gov.uk/registertovote.

This year, all voters who vote in person or by proxy **at polling stations** will also have to show <u>an accepted</u> form of photographic identification before they are given a ballot paper.

If you do not have any of the accepted forms of ID (you can check at www.southnorfolkandbroadland.gov.uk) you can apply online for a free Voter Authority Certificate – this is a photographic identity document specifically for the purpose of voting. The deadline to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate for use at these elections is **5pm on Tuesday 25 April 2023**.

As it's now growing season, James Debbage of Green Pastures answers a few of your "PEAT FREE" QUESTIONS...

Lots of you are currently asking lots of questions about peat free composts. I hope this helps!



- At the time of writing, there is still no specific date when peat-based composts will no longer be sold. At the moment, all we are being told is that it will be "2024!"

- The quality of peat free composts is improving. The feedback we hear is that gardeners often struggle with the cheaper ones but give lots of praise to the premium options, so it appears that you get what you pay for!

- Be aware that peat free compost behaves very differently. They will need more regular watering and liquid feeding compared to peat based counterparts.

- Even before the big switch over next year, there are lots more peat free composts on the market now. Some products have "quietly" become peat free without most people even realising whereas other peat based composts have a lower peat ratio in them to "wean gardeners off"

- New from Norfolk! Look out for the arríval of a new range of locally produced peat free products at Green Pastures from Attleborough based PlantGro. Their extremely highly rated compost which was previously only available in bulk loads is soon to be launched in a range of bagged composts which we are very excited about stocking.

## **BERGH APTON ARTS**

Pat Mlejnecky gives us the history of BACAT (Bergh Apton Community Arts Trust) and tells us of plans for their next event...

In the last edition of 'Broadcast' our next event was announced as taking place this November however, 'the best laid plans......' It will now be performed in the Church in February 2024. Bergh Apton Arts was formed in the early 1990's by those interested in the Arts. We started with two 'Open Garden' events and made bold by the success of these we decided to hold a Sculpture Trail and right from the start set a high standard to show only professional sculptors. Gardens in the village became galleries. The then President of the 'Royal Academy of Arts', Sir Philip Dowson, consented to be our patron, a real coup for such a small group in such a small Norfolk village. Christopher le Brun who later succeeded Sir Philip Dowson as President of RA showed with us. We were the first to show the work of Georgina Warne who now exhibits in a London gallery and in New York. We held six of these Sculpture Trails over the years and thousands of people from a very wide area visited and Bergh Apton became a leading light in the East Anglian Art world. Then Sculpture Trails proliferated and not wanting to be one of a now very large pack we decided to move on, this time into theatre. We already had a very large following and tickets sold like 'hot cakes'. We worked with professionals such as Hugh Lupton, Charlotte Arculus and Mary Lovett but it was those in the village and friends from surrounding villages and towns who acted, sang, played music, made films, in fact turned their hands to anything artistic! It Is always a village production.

After a break of a couple of years or so here we are again with UNLOCK UNEARTH. We have kept this deliberately simple with stories we have written in workshops with Hugh and traditional songs, an evening of simple pleasures. We need your help! As the audience leave they will be given a keepsake, a flexigon. This is a square of paper that can be folded this way and that and printed with the heads of the three men over the south



door of the Church. It is thought they were made in the 1400s, we do not know their names so we named them, Non, Neb and Luck. There will be what we call an EYE, (Earn Your Elevenses) in BAVH on Saturday 15 April starting at 10am and finishing at 12 o'clock. Good coffee and cake - and in return you make a potato print of one of the heads. Peter has taken photos, (see below) and he will be there to show you what to do and give help. Potatoes and paint provided. Do come and help.

## AN INTRIGUING BERGH APTON RECORD IN THE NORFOLK ARCHIVES

If history doesn't interest you pass on, because this story is about my recent encounter with a fragile document recording events in Bergh Apton more than 500 years ago. It's not for you. But it is an interesting subject because, though the document's cover tells us it was the first Bergh Apton Parish Register, there might have been an earlier one, now lost, that was begun in 1538.

That possibility arises from my visit in late February to the Norfolk Record Office (NRO) as part of a project to add to our village archive. I was in the Reading Room, looking at a small (about 16 cm x 28 cm) book of parchment pages\* bound in a dry and wrinkled leather cover on which is written "No 1: Births Marriages and Burials from AD 1556 to 1719".

But, is this really Bergh Apton's first official Register, following a form used in every city, town and village throughout the land, as decreed by Thomas Cromwell, King Henry VIII's Chamberlain? I ask because Cromwell issued his decree in 1538 and this Bergh Apton register begins eighteen years later, in 1556.

That was not a good year for England, on two counts. First, the marriage of our monarch Queen Mary I to King Philip of Spain - one of protagonists in a long war between France and Spain in Italy - risked us being dragged into that conflict. Second, the country was reeling from the results of Mary's determination, having succeeding her half-brother Edward VI in 1553, to wreak revenge on those who had supported her father Henry VIII's split from Rome, a consequence of his determination to divorce Mary's mother, Catherine of Aragon. Out of that cause, whose origins lay in Henry's concern about succession to the throne, came the formation of the Church of England. It was a Protestant religion that Mary was determined to dissolve and return her kingdom to Roman Catholicism. Her campaign resulted in the burning, for the crime of heresy, of the bodies of many protestants including that of the first protestant Archbishop Thomas Cranmer.

In such unsettled times it would be nice to think that here in Bergh Apton, as in most sensible communities, the inhabitants were intent on keeping their heads down until things had calmed down a bit. If that was so, what must they have thought when the Rector, John Matchett, decided - just when the Roman Catholic monarch Mary was on the warpath - to begin a Register in a form decreed eighteen years ago by a Protestant Lord Chamberlain? At

best such aprovocative act was risky. At worst it was suicidal!

So, had a decision been taken in 1538 not to initiate a register in the form required by Cromwell? If so, it was not Matchett's but that of his predecessor Nicholas Harrison, the rector from 1517 to 1545. But a decision taken in 1556 would have been Matchett's. If he took it, one must ask why, and after so long? The logical answer is that Harrison did begin a register in 1538 and that Matchett's 1556 Register was simply a continuation of the status No harm in that. quo. That comfortable conclusion, however, is contravened by the evidence of those faded letters "No 1", on the front of the 1556 Register. So we are back to the question; "Why at a time when it could threaten his life, did John Matchett decide to risk the wrath of Queen Mary ?".

It's a good question but, after all this time, I don't expect to find the answer. If you have one I'd love to hear it.

\*Parchment: a flat sheet made from the prepared skin of an animal, usually a sheep or goat, used in ancient and medieval times as a durable writing surface.

## Christian Aid Week 14th – 20th May

Spring is in the air and, in a few weeks, those little red envelopes will be popping through your door.

As well as undertaking their own ongoing projects around the world, Christian Aid is one of the group of charities working with the Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC).

A year ago, they were in Ukraine delivering first aid kits and medical equipment.

Through their partner organisations on the ground, Christian Aid had been responding to the Syrian Crisis since 2012 so, when the earthquakes struck North West Syria in February this year, they were already poised to help the first responders in that region, even before the DEC put out their national appeal.

Since then, they have increased the scale of their operations and have been delivering winterisation kits (blankets, mattresses, food parcels and heating materials), shelters, mental health support and

cash for local communities. Across the two countries, more than 54,000 buildings have been destroyed leaving hundreds of thousands of people homeless without even the basics; electricity, water, sanitation. Supplies of food, hygiene and medical products - and with hospitals and schools destroyed too.

It takes time and money to rebuild lives, homes and communities. Maybe you have already donated - or do so on a regular basis but, if you can add a little extra this Christian Aid Week, you can be sure that you will be helping to make a real difference.
